A column in a North Carolina paper sent to me by Jim Flythe had some interesting information. It noted that the A. K. C. recently registered its ten millionth dog. Prior to the present book which has 115 breeds listed was the National American Kanny Club which published its first book in 1878 which carried registrations for 1,416 dogs. There were 533 English Setters, 258 Irish Setters, 134 Gordon Setters, 258 cross-bred and other setters, 164 pointers, 50 spaniels and 13 Chesapeake retrievers. The A. K. C. picked up the records of the earlier body and the first dog they registered was an English Setter. Quite a growth!

Charlotte Litwack also brought out the fact that there has never been a case of rabies in Hawaii. They have a strict quarantine system and all dogs and cats flown in must spend 20 days in the Animal Quarantine Shelter in Honolulu. They are met by an inspector and are checked and examined periodically for infectious, contagious and parasitic diseases.

Visiting hours are granted their owners but from only 3 to 5 p.m. week days and 1 to 3 on weekends. The animals are not allowed out during visits but the visitors visit in and may brush and trim pets.

Special provision is made for guide dogs in that the sleeping quarters for their masters are right there and they may spend the night with them.

The greatest number of animals ever quarantined was recorded July 31, 1965 last year when they had 682 dogs and 138 cats!
